On this account, particularly parents are frequently worried about their children making progress in this area and are wondering whether to request therapeutic support, if they do not. In this context, the main issue of intervention is to most effectively [] improve the children's ability to communicate (Donaldson, 1995, p.61). This essay will critically discuss the pros and cons of early therapeutic interventions (ETI) necessity for children without pathological findings, as well as for Late Talkers (LT) and Specific Language Impairment (SLI) as examples for children with language disorders; and will argue that ETI should be carried out on principle, because the costs are outbalanced by the benefits.
